Kurdish-led YPG forces said Thursday that they had begun an offensive against Islamic State in the central Syrian province of Hassakeh as they claimed control of the provincial capital, a monitoring group said. A Syrian Kurdish official also said a similar offensive was planned for the nearby province of Raqqah. "We started our operation in the province of Hassakeh," a YPG

official told Reuters on condition of anonymity. He said that Kurdish forces would launch their assault from the center of Hassakeh towards the villages of Shaaf, Hawt el Zawat, al-Dokan and al-Shafiya. Several hundred YPG fighters had already advanced into the Hassakeh province by Thursday, the official said. Another YPG member, speaking anonymously, also said the militants had left Hassakeh to move to the eastern provinces of

Deir al-Zor and Raqqa, but the exact movement of their troops was not clear. There has been fighting between ISIS and the YPG since March, when the latter, with the backing of the U.S.-led alliance, declared the self-rule Kobani canton in northern Syria. "There is movement at the moment in the direction of Raqqah... " said this official, adding "we don't know exactly their timing, but the offensive in Raqqah will also start

shortly." On Wednesday, the official said the first fighter of the YPG crossed the Turkish border into Syria from the Hassakeh province. On Oct. 9, U.S. President Barack Obama said his country planned to arm Kurdish fighters in a bid to push ISIS out of its strongholds in Syria and Iraq. The move was aimed at protecting moderate Syrian rebels from atrocities committed by the hardline Islamic State group, according to

U.S. defense officials. The first small shipments of weaponry are now ready, the officials said. "We are making progress," U.S. Defense Secretary Ash Carter said, adding that the delivery of weapons would be "a good start." The U.S. State Department said the plan was to train and equip the fighters "in order to enable them to advance the counter-ISIL [the Islamic State group] campaign." The fighting intensified in northern Syria on
